





Passenger was, before the war, a lawyer with his practice in Paris and Mants/s/Seine. After the Armistice he was demobilised and sent back to his residence in Mants.

Deportation of Jews: Passenger knew a manhamed Fillori in the Vichy Government, who told him that the Vichy Government had asked the Germans to take charge of the stateless Jews in France. The Germans wanted to deport the able-bodied Jews only but the Government insisted on their taking complete families, thus including the aged and inform.

Workmen for Germany: French factory owners were actually issuing propaganda to their workmen urging them to go to Germany in order that the owners might save their factories. The Germans had threatened to close the factories if they had no volunteers. This was in July 1942.














Damaged mail from the Yankee Clipper when it crashed in Lisbon on February 22, 1943







