These two frames focus on the definitive issues during this period as follows:

The **1953 issue** mainly covers the printings as per Ulrich and Klugel and based on the flurescence of the paper, and plate blocks.

The **1962 building issue** showing the major listed vatieties including the 2d green omitted, lilac onitted and an imperforate block of four. It contains most of the watermark errors (missing either of the two recorded 1/3 inverted watermark) and continues with colour shifts and other fun errors.

It should be noted that there are numerous tiny flaws and specks that could be used to position many of the values. In addition the printings of most of the values can be determined from the extra perforation (or lack thereof) holes in the corner margins The audience will be greatful that these are not included in this display.

In 1970 Bermuda decide to change from the sterling system to dollars and cents as the majority of our tourist are from the Untied States. This was a fairly quick decision that meant the flower stamps that were to be release were delayed to have their values changed to reflect the new currecy and the existing building set was surchaged using old stock of the 1d, 2d, 3d,6d and 2/3 stamps from Bermuda and new printings for the remainder of the values.

The **1970 decimal issue** includes watermark errors, surcharge errors such as the surcharge omitted on the 5/- stamp, colour and surcharge shifts.

Commemoratives - from the 1953 Coronation to the 1969 Treasures Bermuda only produced 21 issues of commemorative stamps including two that overprinted the 3d and 1/3 stamps from the 1953 definitives.

While there are numerous small varieties I decided to only show three pages covering the 1953 Coronation as it includes the plate proof, the 1953 Royal Visit and the 1958 Perot Post Office as they have photo essays. The 1968 Human Rights due to the double and triple of the birds on the 2/6 value and one of the four peice of the original artwork. The final page include the 1968 Olympics with brown omitted on the 3d of which there are 26 known examples, and the 1969 treasure set due to colour shifts on the 1/3 stamp.

Bermuda released a set of 16 values on 9 November 1953 from a $\frac{1}{2}$ d to a £1 value and added an 8d value on 16th May 1955 and the 9d on 6th January 1958. Sheets consist of two panes of 60 stamps with a margin between. The horizontal design stamps are twelve rows of five stamps and for the vertical designs there are ten rows of six stamps. Stamps from the left pane have plate number 1 etc, those on the right pane have a plate number with an "a" suffix.

Regrettably there are few flaws or errors in this issue, therefore this frame is more of a display of the printings and of the different values in plate blocks. In addition examples are shown of stamps that were made into coils which can be determined by cutting of perforations and by coil joins.

While there are some shade differences much work on printings must be done using UV lights and further information can be found in a series of five articles in the Bermuda Post by Robert Kugel in the March 2000 issue.
