
The content of this exhibit . This exhibit includes most of the significant essays, proofs, specimens and varieties

The rarity statements are based on research over a number of years in putting together the Bermuda Stamp Catalog and the exhibitors auction records for he past 50 years.


Bermuda joined the Universal Postal Union in April 1877 and membership required postcards to be provided for the public. However, nothing was dome until after the reorganization of the post office in 1878-79. The Post Office Regulation Act, Amendment Act of 1879 on July 22nd allowed that postcards would be procurred. It was not until a year later that postcards were finally made available for public use.

Section: I: Cards Oueen Victoria

Printing: The first postal cards were printed by Donald McPhee Lee, Queen's Printer and publisher of the Royal Gazette. Postage was paid by affixing stamps to the pre-printed spaces on the card prior to sale. The 1/2d (Inland) and 11/2d (Foreign) card were released by the Post Office on July 1, 1880 and August 1, 1880, respectively. Lee also printed surcharges on the Provisionals in 1893. Regualr cards with a pre-printed indicum, were ordered from De la Rue in 1884 and were received on 1885. De La Rue continued to produce all cards between that date and about 1960.


Due to a shortage of the blue card stamp it was necessary to use the 1½d stock but placing the ½d stamp on the right over the space of the 1d. First issued in 25 Feb 1885 and officially used until 25 March 1885.



First Day of Issue



1½d foreign rate stock card used with only the ½d stamp for local use at the local rate..



Apparently a ½d provisional local card, shown by the ½d stamp on the right. Uprated with a 1d stamp for foreign postage to New York. Used on May 14, seven weeks after the end of the oficial dates for the ½ providional so suing left over stock?



1884 Artist's drawing in red ink on tracing paper for an Inland ½d Postal Stationery Postcard endorsed "Specimen No. 2". This drawing , which is ex De La Rue records was prepared locally and sent to them by Bermuda as the suggested design foe the 1885 issue of the Postcards to be undertaken by De la Rue to replace the 1880 series of Formula Cards, but omits several mistakes made in the original 1880 issue - namly the wording "Universal Postal Union" and the French inscription "Les Isles Bermudes" both of which are not required for an Inland Card! The drawing still incorporates the Bermuda Post Office and Crown in a double oval and bears a small sample of the desired blue stock in the lower right hand corner. Neither of these suggestions were adopted by De la Rue in their 1885 issue.

Section: II: Registered Envelope Queen Victoria

The four specimens on this and the following page were sent to Bermuda by McCorquodale and Co., Limited Contractors. They were attempting to compete with De la Rue for producing registered envelopes. The used example is the only recorded usa of a McCorquodale envelope in Bermuda.








Section: II: Registered Envelopes Queen Victoria

Registration dates to 1556 during the reign of Queen Mary the current system from 1841 where the letter was enclosed in a green sheet that was used as a receipt and returned to the sender. This developed into the use of a ribbon follwood by ta[e and string. The introduction of registered enveloped in 1878 the string was replaced by printed blue crossed lines that survived into the modern era.
